#### Act I

Scene 1: A hilltop near Camelot - a long time ago.
Scene 2: Near Camelot - immediately following.
Scene 3: Arthur's study - five years later.

Scene 4: Countryside near Camelot - a few months later.
Scene 5: A park near the castle - immediately following.
Scene 6: A terrace of the castle - sundown, two months later.

Scene 7: The dressing tents outside the jousting field - the next day.

Scene 8: The grandstand of the field - immediately following.

Scene 9: The terrace - early evening, the same day.

Scene 10: The corridor leading to the great hall - immediately following.

Scene 11: The great hall - immediately following.

#### Act II

Scene 1: Main terrace of the castle - a few years later, afternoon.

Scene 2: The terrace - late afternoon, one month later.

Scene 3: A forest near Camelot - the next day, later afternoon.
Scene 4: The forest of Morgan Le Fey - immediately following.

Scene 5: Corridor of the castle - later that night.
Scene 6: The queen's bedchamber - later that night.

Scene 7: Camelot - immediately following.

Scene 8: The battlefield outside Joyous Gard - predawn.



#### THE STORY

Many sources list Arthur as a legendary king, but some give his exact parentage: that he was the illegitimate son of the Duchess of Cornwall, raised as an orphan in ignorance of his royal origin and educated by the wizard Merlyn. He made good his inheritance to kingship when he drew the sword Excalibur from the stone, and then proved to be a wise, fearless and excellent ruler who dreamed of creating a utopian state where might would only be exercised in the name of right.

To this end he gathered around him the staunchest knights of the land whose vows of honor became the creed of chivalry. But Arthur's dream was shattered through treachery and betrayal. The tragic overthrow of his kingdom, brought on by the conduct of his wife Guenevere and his knight of knights, Lancelot, effected by his unworthy son, Mordred, assure us that Arthur remains a human being in spite of his almost godlike perfection.

Nevertheless, it is the legendary Arthur, created by poets centuries later out of the fragmentary memories handed down by word of mouth, which remains. It is this Arthur who is the central figure of CAMELOT, wearing the elaborate armor and heraldic symbols of the Middle Ages and surrounded by knights and glittering ladies. As the Arthurian romances evolved through the centuries they became more and more threaded with Christianity. There crept into them the epic of the Holy Grail, the cup from which Christ had drunk at the Last Supper. In the quest for it, Lancelot failed because of his illicit love for Guenevere, while his son, Sir Galahad, succeeded, though at the cost of his life.
