Director's Note

It is no longer an extraordinary event when an original play premiers at a Brigham Young University Theater because the original script is now a common thing in our season of plays. I think this speaks very highly of our theater department. I suspect that we do more original plays at BYU than any other university in the world. Because of the availability of theaters in which directors are willing to produce original scripts, the number of scripts that are being written at BYU and in this valley is amazing.

When I came to BYU ten years ago, I was assigned to direct an original script and had a difficult time finding one that I thought was stage-worthy. It was No Greater Crown by Martin C. Nalder which he wrote for his Masters Degree in Theater at the University of Utah, that I finally chose. Each year since then, there have been more and more original scripts written until now it is difficult to

make a decision: which of the many worthy scripts should be produced.

I have found great inner satisfaction in working with original plays and have produced a variety since that first one: A Day, a Night, and a Day, a drama by Douglas Stewart; And They Shall Be Gathered, a drama by Martin Kelly; Children of the Sun, an Incan ritual by Biggs and Whitman; The Apostate, a drama by Orson Scott Card; Across Five Summers, a comedy by Card; Stone Tables, a musical by Card and Stoddard; Giraffe Story, a musical by Robert Stoddard; Shepherd of the Lord, a biblical drama by Beverly Warner; and Nineveh, a musical by Connie Walker and R. C. Christensen. Several of these plays in production have achieved a cathartic effect in the audience which is what Aristotle said was the purpose of tragedy. I don't believe, though, that any of them are, strictly speaking, "tragedy." Fires of the Mind might have been called "The Tragedy of Barney Johnson," for Robert Elliott has written a modern tragedy in which the protagonist's tragic flaw is pride and self doubt which eventually leads to Mormon tragedy: apostasy.
