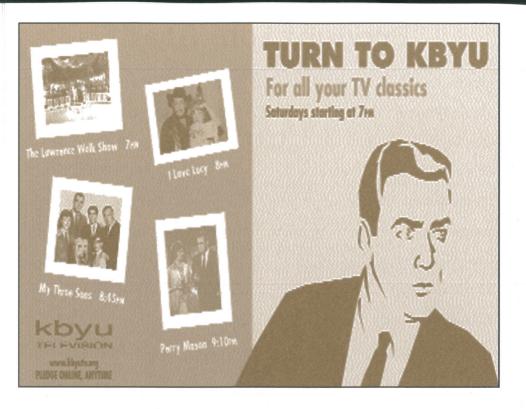

A Great Chain of Being

Archipelago, winner of the William P. and Arlene R. Lewis Playwriting Contest for Women, is an original script written by LeeAnne Hill Adams, former graduate student in our program. It is a play about people sent to the Kolyma prison camp in Siberia as "counterrevolutionaries" in the eyes of Joseph Stalin and his government.

Woven through the tapestry of the hardships and inhumane treatment of those who lived and died in the Gulag is the story of Nina Hagen-Torn, a woman who was twice sent to Gulag prison camps—or "meat grinders," as she called them. She is the focus of the theme, and the light of the play.

In a short poem which the historical Nina wrote while awaiting interrogation for being an "enemy of the people," she articulated her need to express her soul to others through her poems, and her faith in something on the other side of suffering:

Having got up to pray, silent I stand, Raising my heart like a candle. If it lights with a radiant flame Then I shall have the unfathomable answer.

My weary brain throbs at my temples, The wax falls in white drops. In my melting heart, faith bursts into life With an imperishable flame.

We hope that this play invokes within the minds and souls of the audience a glimpse of Nina's faith: that in the face of suffering, hardship, and agony, one can endure and triumph. Faith does not exist separate from its opposites, adversity and darkness.

How can young BYU students embody the stories of those who suffered in the Gulag? How can we who live in a free nation—who have plenty to eat, whose national pastimes include shopping, eating out, and entertainment of all kinds—comprehend the depths of agony experienced by those whose lives were systematically stripped away from them by their own countrymen and neighbors, their "friends," and even their own family members?

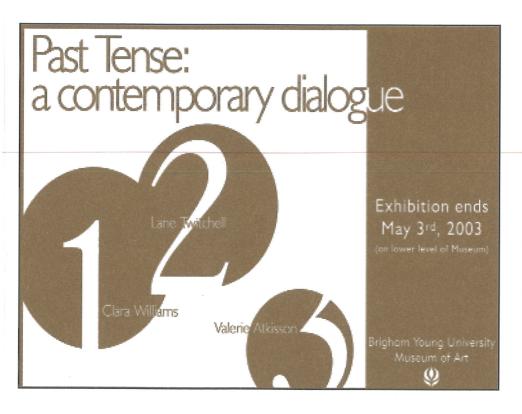

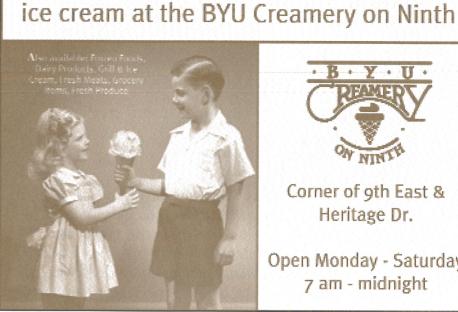

Art and In/Humanity in the Gulag

During the period known as the Great Terror in Russia in the 1930s, Joseph (Ioseph Vissarionovich) Stalin personally instituted the rise and promulgation of Soviet prison camps. To these camps were sent literally millions of artists, intellectuals, and political "criminals." The Terror saw the growth of such camps, named the "Gulag Archipelago" by writer and prisoner Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn, and the growth of state-funded labor projects such as the Volga River Canal.

In spite of the millions of rubles that were lost in many of the labor camp projects, there was a deeper cost: human dignity. These human costs were apparent in the art and poetry of the prisoners of the Gulag and the horrific accounts of those who miraculously survived. *Archipelago* is an attempt to recover a few of the voices of those who suffered blamelessly and to tell their stories. And though healthy, affluent Americans cannot claim to fully embody the experiences of starved and broken prisoners, we can attempt to learn and understand.

For many of the Gulag prisoners who were artists and philosophers by trade, their art was a vital part of life—not a choice, but an obligation. The artwork that has survived the horrors of the prison camps provides valuable insight into the suffering of the prisoners, and a peek into the depth of the human psyche and its ability to cope with atrocity. Because artists and intellectuals had been targeted specifically, many of the prisoners shared artistic ways of dealing with their pain. For many years the culturally elite community of the Gulag witnessed some of the finest theatrical performances and poetry recitations in all of Russia in the 1930s and 1940s. The prisoners recognized that the works of artists like Nina Hagen-Torn (also a character in *Archipelago*) were deeply expressive of a condition that no one who hadn't experienced the horror

of the Soviet prison camps could ever fully comprehend. And yet they also recognized as imperative the eventual publication of such works, lest the prisoners' experiences die with them.

In her memoirs, Nina Hagen-Torn remembers the "necessity" of verse:

There is a particular joy when you free your will from your captive body and can take control of your mind. It is as if a free wind is blowing through your head and calls across the millennia to all your imprisoned brothers and sisters . . . [poetry] is a monument to my inner freedom, a way of making the soul invulnerable.

-Vitaly Shentalinsky *Arrested Voices*, 129-30

Nina retained human dignity, despite its exploitation, because she understood her own abilities and held tightly to them. In addition, she is one example of many prisoners who were starkly aware of the ludicrous contrast between "realities"—on the one hand, an imaginary consciousness constructed by an immense propaganda machine, and on the other hand, the ferocious reality the prisoners experienced every day.

The Gulag's cost in human dignity is unfathomable. *Archipelago* exemplifies how dangerous it is to lose one another's stories. Nations that lose human stories on a great scale risk suffering significant consequences for generations to come. The play is a lucid depiction of the feeble economic strategies of the Stalinist era, and of a governmental organization that blinded itself and its citizens into believing that under the guise of "re-education," a new country could be built on the bent backs of starving bodies and broken spirits.
