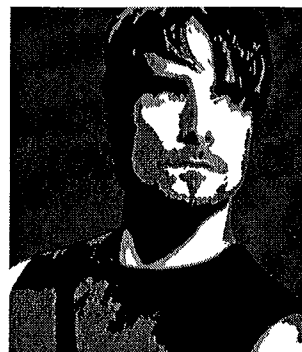
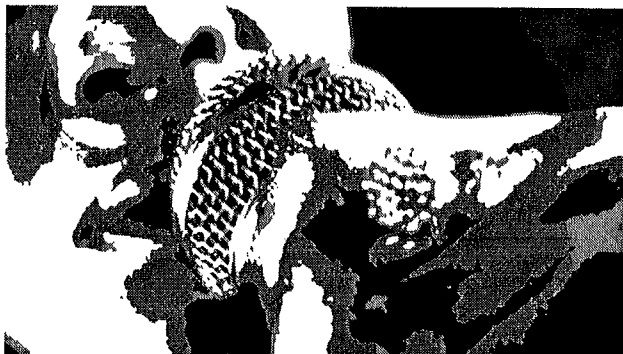

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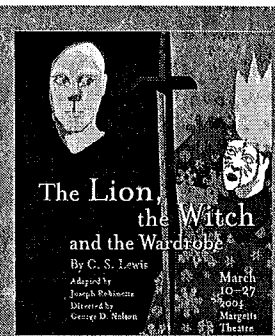

A Graceful Parable

Christian religious practice is designed to evoke a remembrance of the gift of grace from our Heavenly Father that we "might become pure, even as He is pure." This vicarious gift wrought by his son, Jesus Christ, is the central theme of Christianity and the ultimate example of how a Christian should live. To truly follow the Savior we must be willing to make meaningful sacrifices for others who cannot do for themselves. This is one of the most important yardsticks by which to measure our lives.

C. S. Lewis knew this to his core. He deeply understood the atonement and how personal commitment to Christ needs to be more than words. Lewis wanted to leave his posterity a glimpse of his personal faith to help them shape their lives after the perfect example of the Savior. His *Chronicles of Narnia* draw deep analogies as well as sweet and simple connections between the Christian view of the world—with its constant struggle between good and evil—and the struggles of the characters of Narnia.

The story of *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe* is set against the backdrop of great sacrifice. Peter, Susan, Edmund and Lucy have been sent away from London for protection from the ravages of the Second World

War. They, like many of the children of their generation, were protected from the terror of an advancing enemy by the deep personal sacrifices of their parents and others of their generation. Personal safety was laid on the altar to procure the hope for a better tomorrow.

The Apostle John questioned our ability to love a God we have not seen if we cannot love the people around us. Likewise a true remembrance of the atonement of Christ needs to be linked with a deep appreciation for all the Christ-like sacrifices that have been made by men and women of all ages. Not the least of these is a daily acknowledgement of the sacrifices of all good parents for their children.

We will never be able to repay our earthly or heavenly parents, nor anyone who has sacrificed for our good. This, however, is not required of the faithful. Our duty is only to remember and follow in the same selfless footsteps. Of Aslan's sacrifice for Edmund, Lucy queried, "Does he know what Aslan did for him? Does he know what the arrangement with the witch really was?" When Susan responded, "Of course not," Lucy asked if he should be told. Susan took a position that is understandable, but one with which I disagree. She said, "Oh surely

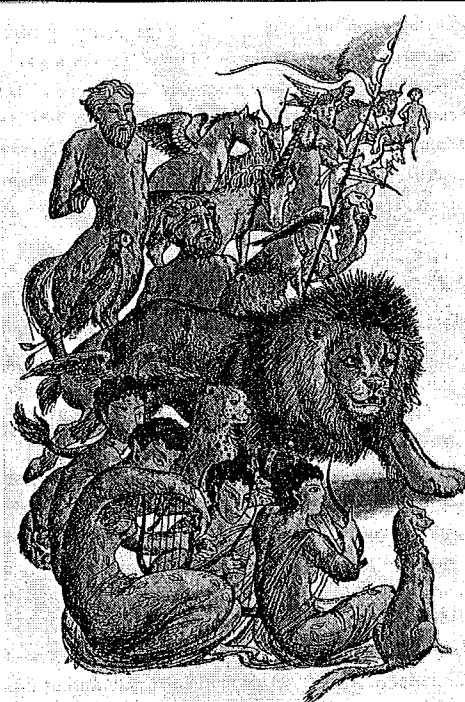
Cast

This production is entered in the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival (KC/ACTF). The aims of this national theater education are to identify and promote quality in college-level theater production. To this end, each production entered is eligible for a response by a regional KC/ACTF representative, and certain students are selected to participate in KC/ACTF programs involving awards, scholarships, and special grants for actors, playwrights, designers, and critics at both the regional and national levels.

Productions entered on the participating level are eligible for inclusion at the KC/ACTF regional festival and can also be considered for invitation to the KC/ACTF national festival at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C., in the spring of 2004.

Last year, more than 1,000 theater productions and 19,000 students participated in KC/ACTF nationwide. By entering into this production, our department is sharing the KC/ACTF goals to help college theater grow and to focus attention on the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.
