Our journey has opened up precious peeks into our own past and a deeper appreciation for the wide-open wonder of childhood. Our exploration into this world has reconfirmed the words of Alma when he taught, "Little children do have words given unto them many times, which confound the wise and the learned."

We live in a world that seems to be in an open assault against purity and innocence in any form . . . especially as it exists in the unsullied heart of a child. Hate, revenge, confrontation, hardness

of heart, perversion, and lack of compassion are eclipsing our national psyche and reaping a societal east wind. BECOME AS LITTLE CHILDREN


We all read the funnies every now and again, and we're all familiar with *Peanuts*, but are the comic strip and the resulting musical, *You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown* merely for laughs? Can we actually learn anything from them? Charles Schulz said, "I believe that one of the ways we learn in this life is to take the past and lay it over the present to see how they compare" (Schulz, 11).

If we try to remember who we were when we were children, perhaps we'll gain some insights into who we are today. Were we a fussbudget like Lucy? Are we still? Were we constantly struggling with things we didn't understand like Sally? Do we still? Were the odds constantly against us like Charlie Brown? Are they still? The important question is: Have we learned to deal with who we are? Have we learned to work with others as Lucy needs to do? Or have we given up? Have we learned to continue studying what fascinates us despite the ridicule of others as Sally? Or have we given up? Have we learned to like ourselves even if the kite always gets eaten by the tree or the baseball game is lost 40-0 like with Charlie Brown? Or have we given up?

Charles Schulz explained, "Our personalities and characteristics are established, usually, by the time we are five or six years old, but the lids are on. We are like boiling pots on a stove, and when we are small, the adults keep the lids on. As children, we cannot express ourselves the way we would like to, but as we grow older, the lids pop off, and the characteristics come out. We also discover ways to protect ourselves—to no longer be put into the positions of fear and anxiety that we are forced to be in as children.

As children, we are forced to go to school, to be in a room with thirty other kids, to do things we don't want to do or that will make fools of us. When we become adults, we make sure that we no longer get trapped. Unfortunately, this also robs us of many wonderful adventures" (Schulz, 33). There are definite benefits to being grown up. The answer is not to stay a boy forever, as Peter Pan would suggest. However, if in our adult worlds we remain so far distant from children that we forget the simple things, we've not only robbed ourselves of many wonderful adventures but of rich joy and happiness as well.


