## **Voyages**

Part of the mystery behind *Pericles* is whether Shakespeare actually wrote it. Most scholars agree that the play was co-written, which was not uncommon at the time. Certain scenes feel like plot advancers, while others ring with the poetry, language, and metaphor unique to Shakespeare. No matter who wrote the play, however, there is no denying that it is an exciting story, with much to offer young audiences.

Like Pericles, each of us have to make a journey through life. Nobody gets a smooth ride all of the time, and that's part of the challenge. There are storms, shipwrecks, loss, and sadness. But there is also sunshine, victory, discovery, and joy. And in that sense, Shakespeare—with his mysterious writing partner—have created an exciting adventure story that also rings true to the human experience. Maybe, in a sense, we are the writing partner. We insert ourselves and our experiences into the many trials and situations Pericles goes through and, by doing so, become a player in the story. This active audience participation is part of what makes Shakespeare so special and so resonant.

This has been a wonderful experience. I love working with creative casts who are willing to stretch their imaginations and their performances to tell interesting stories. Many thanks to BYU's Department of Theatre and Media Arts department for allowing us this opportunity.


# Shakespeare's Romances

Pericles is often categorized as one of Shakespeare's "romance" plays written towards the end of his career. Along with Cymbeline, The Winter's Tale, and The Tempest, Pericles strongly resembles a fairytale. The romances explore similar motifs found in folklore and myths such as storms at sea, young princes and princesses, the intervention of gods, separation between families, and reconciliation. Many scholars have debated the reasoning for Shakespeare's turn to such stories in his later years. Some hypothesize that he was bored with everything except poetry and was simply experimenting. Others theorize that he was catering to the change in taste of his audiences,

not dissimilar from the stream of romantic comedies flooding our movie theatres today. Yet, F E. Halliday links the romances to the particular part of Shakespeare's life when he wrote them. In Shakespeare's later years he renewed his ties with Stratford, his daughter got married, and he welcomed a grandchild (Zesmer 407). Similarly, the theme of father-daughter reunion resonates in his later plays.

# Question of Authorship

Whether or not Shakespeare wrote *Pericles* in its entirety remains a widely debated topic. Acts I and II seem to vary from Shakespeare's typical writing style in a way that most scholars believe he did not write them. Whether Shakespeare wrote the entire



piece, collaborated with another author, or added his master touches to a partially written work, the question of authorship caused *Pericles* to be left out of the First Folio of Shakespeare's published works in 1623.

# Origins of Pericles

Pericles can be traced back to the tale of Apollonius of Tyre from third-century Greece. Since then, the story has been revived numerous times, but John Gower's 1390 English translation entitled Confession Amantis seems to be the basis of Shakespeare's play.



It was not uncommon for authors to collaborate and borrow from other texts in Shakespeare's time. Even now, stories are often composites of folktales that are a part of our heritage. Does Pericles remind you of any other stories or texts?
