AN INTERVIEW WITH THE DIRECTOR

One day Megan Sanborn Jones (director of *Travesties*) and I were talking about our respective productions and especially about the relationship between the two scripts. As a result of that conversation we decided to invite our dramaturgs to interview us and use the resulting transcript as material for our program notes. Below is the note for *The Importance of Being Earnest*. Please take the opportunity to see *Travesties* (November 11-December 3, 2016 in the Margetts Theatre) and compare not only the two program notes, but more importantly the productions themselves.

RC: What was the seed of this idea, this *Travesties/Earnest* experience?

RDS: Megan planted the seed a decade ago, and she's been cultivating it ever since.

NSJ: Really it's tied up to curriculum, because I've used *Travesties* in a lot of different classes. I can't think of a better play that teaches the time period 1875-1915. It's a delight, but for me it's hard to access if you don't know *Earnest*, and so it always made sense to me that you should do the two together.

RDS: And the opportunity of doing that finally came up this year. Megan was able to get the rights to do them both. Her dream came true.

RC: I think it's easy to see Travesties as being inspired by Earnest.

RDS: Of course.

RC: But I'd be interested, Rodger, how has Earnest been inspired by what Megan has been doing on Travesties?

There are many resonances between the two. *Earnest* came before and in many ways inspired *Travesties*. However, our production of *Earnest* is now being influenced by our production *Travesties*. And visa versa. Even though the initial inspiration was linear in time, the influence now goes both ways. So, some of what I'm doing in *Earnest* is now being informed by what Professor Jones is doing in *Travesties*. We have conversations about what the other is doing with sets, lights, props and staging. I get ideas from her and she from me. This creative collaboration between productions makes for a kind of cross-pollination that is delightful in its application. It is especially noticeable in the sets and costumes. But it is also subtly evident in some of the staging.

So what rewarding opportunities did you two face while you were trying to tie these shows together?

Initially we held auditions together. Later, in an *Earnest* rehearsal, Professor Jones brought her cast in to look at some of the staging, which she then modeled in *Travesties*. We also had multiple conversations about sharing images and props ideas between productions. Professor Jones often came into our production meetings where together we explored the reflections between the scripts. Sharing the physical structures of the set was one of the most informative collaborations we had. Because Travis Coyne designed both sets, he devised a way to use the same structural format for both shows. The set for *Earnest* is lightweight and transparent while the set of *Travesties* is heavy and dense. Yet hidden within and behind the set of *Travesties* is the set of *Earnest*. And submerged within the set of *Earnest* are ideas and images from the set of *Travesties*.

MSJ: They echo very clearly.

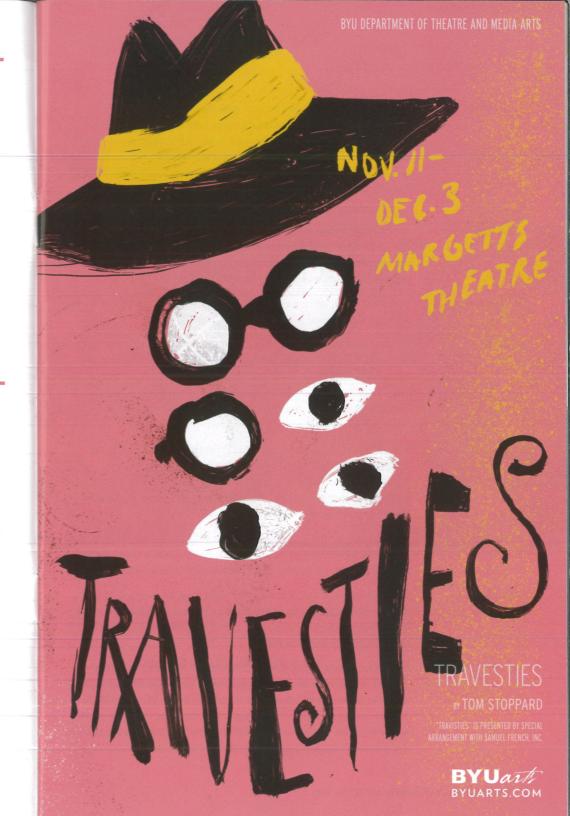

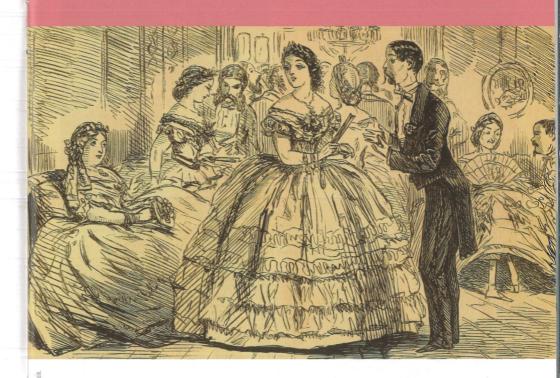
