A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

While Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet is commonly seen as a story of fate, I have always seen it as a story of miscommunication and misunderstanding. Because of this I felt a bilingual adaptation would provide opportunities to expand those moments in the play. And by introducing the Spanish-language and Latino cultures into the story, I hoped the focus on multiculturalism would help provide numerous access points for young and diverse community members to engage with this production. From these ideas, Romeo y Julieta was born.

I believe that the adaptation and translation of a traditional and monocultural script towards a nontraditional and multicultural one must involve diverse and varied artists; and indeed, many, many people helped with this adaptation. From fifth grade students at Sharon Elementary school in Orem, Utah, to my own father, Peter Ashworth (emeritus professor from the BYU Department of Spanish). Our cast and crew even received hands-on guidance and tutelage from one of this country's most prolific Latino-American playwrights for young audiences, José Cruz González—we are indebted to him and grateful for his support. However, the most help I received in this adaptation came from the very students involved in the play. The native-speaking actors in the play represent a wide variety of Latino cultures, from Mexican, to Peruvian, to Spanish, to Puerto Rican. And many of the other students involved are either fluent in Spanish, or bring seemingly endless acting, design, translation and dramaturgical skills. You will feel all of their influences in this play; their lives and experiences are intertwined throughout the language, sound, feel and look of this production. This truly was an enormous collaborative effort, and a labor of love.

Our hopes for your experience with this production are that you will see and hear the vital role that communication plays not only between young people, but between young people and the adults in their lives. We hope you see ways to improve communication in your own life. We also hope that this production builds a more diverse and inclusive audience, as we try to expand the idea of who we are as a community, and what we might become one day.
