



#### EMILY DICKINSON

#### Notes by Paula Eckern and Robert Nelson

Emily Dickinson, born 10 December 1830 to a prominent Amherst, Massachusetts, lawyer, was well trained socially and culturally. She was educated at several schools in the area and at Mount Holyoke Female Seminary in South Hadley. She gradually began to withdraw, associating with few people outside her immediate family and select friends, finally withdrawing into almost complete seclusion, dressing in white more and more as the years went by. She wrote her poems during her seclusion. Only seven were published during her lifetime--all anonymously. There has been much conjecture concerning an unhappy romance that may have caused Emily never to leave her father's house in Amherst. But most Dickinson scholars now agree that the affair was conducted mainly in her creative mind and through correspondence and in her poetry. After a two year illness, she died 15 May 1886.

According to Thomas H. Johnson, "Emily Dickinson had no formal theory of poetics, but she had a consistent idea of the manner in which the poet is inspired." Realizing that she could not work by intuition alone, she carefully selected each word, and labored to create sharp images and bold forms. This boldness, in fact, "doomed her to obscurity in her lifetime." She was "possessed to a most uncommon degree by emotional responses so acute as to be painful to herself and others." Perhaps this is why she chose to avoid direct human contact, engaging with the outside world almost exclusively through voluminous letters. "But poetry was the act for which her life was set apart . . . . So unwilling was she to be diverted from her calling, from her own originalities which those capable of evaluating only dimly understood, that she made deliberate choice of obscurity in her own lifetime. She was right in her assurance that if fame belonged to her, she could not in the end escape it."
