The time is 1950; however, except for the prologue and Alvin's exit in the last scene, the action takes place as it is seen and interpreted through the eyes of the mature Alvin's imagination, as he reflects upon the people and events of his childhood. Most of his remembrances center upon the months of June and July, 1935; thus all of the characters, including his boyhood self, are represented as they appeared to him during this era.

* * * DIRECTOR'S NOTE

To me the most beautiful sound in the world is the rushing song of the leaves as the wind rushes through them down at the old house. I long to be there now, when the wind is at rest and the soul is peaceful, all is quiet and the symphony of the leaves sooths the sorrow of life

When he was finally able to write STILL THE MOUNTAIN WIND, David thought that many of his hauntings would cease, that his conflicting "outside world" experience would find understanding and identification but he was never able to wipe it from his troubled mind. It returned in rushing remembrances.

I first met David Wright in 1956; I saw STILL THE MOUNTAIN WIND at the Lyric Theatre in Logan, Utah, and seeing his play is seeing David. Some years later I directed the play in Beaver, Utah and toured the show to several Southern Utah towns. That's when David and I started corresponding and telephoning. Before that year was over we had collaborated on a staged version of SPEAK YE TENDERLY OF KINGS which was later done for television.

When I directed STILL THE MOUNTAIN WIND again at the University of Minnesota, David brought his family to the production and we met for the first time in person. a "first time" meeting, however; we knew each other very well.

Another time in Bennington, Idaho, where David was born and in Montpelier, Idaho, where I was born we spent hours together walking through the old haunts and talking about the two plays. I don't suppose I've ever met another person whose tie to his birthplace was so strong; in many respects he was hewn from his senses of his mountain retreat. When I directed this play at the University of Minnesota, it was extremely well received and I thought I would never direct it again and yet here I am directing it for the third time, fourth if you count a production in Paris, France, with the Semester Abroad, but that production never reached the audiences because of an accident to a cast member. always said I don't want to direct a show a second time because I've said all I want the first time. Perhaps David's voice prompts me . . . come home Alvin Simmons . . . so still . . . the mountain wind. Charles W Whitmon
