

THEATRE POLICIES

- 1. The theatre reserves the right to change any scheduled play.
- In case of accident or emergency, the theatre reserves the right to cancel performances without prior notice. Ticket holders for canceled performances will be given an exchange or refund.
- 3. The theatre will exchange season tickets provided the exchange for any given play is made at least two days prior to the scheduled season-ticket date.
- 4. Infants and children under six years of age will not be admitted to the theatre. Specific exceptions to this policy will be noted for special productions for children.
- Patrons are asked to attend productions in best dress.
- 6. Theatre doors are closed promptly at the curtain opening. Latecomers will be seated at the most appropriate time in the performance.
- 7. Tickets reserved by telephone must be picked up two days before the performance for which they were reserved. Tickets not picked up will be replaced on sale.

EXCHANGE POLICY

If you cannot attend on your scheduled night, you may exchange your tickets for an alternate performance if the exchange is made at least two days before your scheduled performance.
