Star splits her time between Utah and New York. Between enjoying her new six-month-old daughter, Emma Madison, traveling with her husband on set locations, visiting her daughter Ryen who is attending boarding school in Connecticut and her son Rory who graduates from the French Culinary Institute in New York in November, she still finds times to perform. This last year she was able to work on five films, most recently a movie of the week with Tom Skerritt. "As much as I love the challenge of film and



television, live theater remains my greatest love. I am greatly saddened to see how many young people are never exposed to the classics or able to experience the thrill of a live musical."

Star has performed in dinner theaters and summer stock theaters throughout the Intermountain West. She performed at Sundance Theater for more than twenty years, delighting audiences with her comedy antics and large, brassy voice in such shows as Gypsy, Annie, Paint Your Wagon, Oklahoma and The Revues. This year her film work includes Bitter Markings, In the Blink of an Eye, and It was Him or Us.

"I love living in New York and the constant opportunity to

feast on Broadway shows-classics, comedy, musicals-and being able to meet people whom I've always admired from a distance." Recently she and her husband dined at the White House with the Clintons, and her biggest thrill was meeting and talking with Anthony Hopkins. "You find that people are people no matter where you travel. My heart still delights in returning to perform in Utah-especially with dear friends."

Hmmm... I'm a wife of one of the most creative people I have ever known, the mother of two of the neatest (as in cool, warm, fun, smart, sensitive) little girls I know, I'm a teacher, student, leader, follower...Sometimes I feel that I wear as many hats as there are moments in the day. My universe can seem pretty vast at times.

I grew up in Orem, Utah, served a mission in Sydney, Australia, graduated from BYU, and lived in New York City for seven years, where I performed with the Manhattan Theater Ensemble and did

some Off-Broadway stuff. I've performed on many stages (like Sundance for six years) doing musicals like The Sound of Music, Into the Woods, Side by Side by Sondheim, The Scera Shell with The King and I, Camelot, Kiss Me Kate, and most recently Robert and Elizabeth. I've gotten filmed for a bunch of movies and commercials, and sung on lots of CDs including my own which is currently in the making. It's been a very unboring life so far. Oh, and I've traveled to some really incredible places like Greece, Egypt, Europe, and behind the former Iron Curtain.

Starting at age four I used to sing passionately to my older sisters' musical theater albums such as West Side Story and Man of La Mancha (ironically, two shows I've yet to be in) as well as any Julie Andrews or Barbara Steisand (now there's a combination of voices to train with) records they brought home. It may sound corny, but I always knew I was to be a singer/actress. There really wasn't a lot of choice for me to be anything else and still be true to myself. So now I've been one for a really long time, and you know what I've found? It's just a vehicle for the real gift, which for me is love for and from the Father. I hope you get it.

Peggy Matheson How do I describe who I am, or what I'm all about? You know, I don't have any particularly interesting stories to

tell about my life, although I do remember getting the neatest pajamas with angel wings on them for my fourth birthday. I thought I had died and gone to heaven. It was especially memorable since there were two of us nine children running around in them-Penny and me, "the red-headed

twins."

Over the years, it has been very

hard for people to resist saying something about my red hair, and "oh, there's two of them!" Now this has followed me during all of my impressionable 34 years, and though it has been a great ego boost at times, it has only been in the last few years that I have really evaluated its impact on my life. Now I am a gutless wonder and could not risk losing my marriage or any acting jobs by shaving my head bald to prove I had value beyond my own red-headedness, so the next best thing was to cut it short. This, I felt, would be the true test of friendship and marriage. Well, I am happy to say that I am still married and none of my friends have run away screaming that I have betrayed them. Playing Queen Elixabeth in March Tale last fall at BYU has given me a new perspective on red-headedness. It's the woman, not the hair that counts. Oh, the hard lessons of life.

Now if you want to know where you've seen this familiar face before, I can tell you that if it's not Penny it's probably me...I mean in films or stage stuff, etc. I worked up at Sundance for five seasons and have performed in other local theatrical productions. Among the film roles I have played, *The Together Forever Lady* is probably my favorite. It

was simply a gift.

I can't think of anything more fulfilling than to give when you have been given to. Here I am, thanks to my family, friends, and all of you, trying to give a little back. So are you on the verge of shaving your head bald?

Rosanna has recorded her own Christmas album, How far to Bethlehem... sung on various other musical recordings, as well as books on tape and other voiceover work. She graduated from BYU in Theatre Education and taught high school drama for seven years before returning to BYU to complete her masters' degree in Education Administration. Since that

time she has served as an assistant principal at Provo High and now at Farrer Middle School. "I choose to work in education because I believe in young people, and I think they desperately need to be surrounded by people who care about and believe in them, people who can help them

realize their own gifts and potential."

Rosanna still makes time to perform and direct. She has directed more than 25 plays and musicals, and is currently directing Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat at the Scera Shell. She also established and coordinates the Community Artists Concert at the Shell "so that the community can see the kind of diversity and talent we have in this valley, and to give new talent a venue." She has performed in more than 35 plays and musicals, including six seasons at Sundance and still fits in an occasional film, info-mercial, or television spot.









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### Sisters, Mothers, Wives and Friends by Rosanna Weeks Ungerman

Several years ago I began working on an album I had planned to record. It was going to be called "Sisters, Mothers, Wives, & Friends" or something like that. But I found the more material I gathered, and the closer I got to recording, the project was just not taking the shape I wanted. It finally occurred to me that this album needed to include the voices of several women and that it might just make a powerful staged performance with the collective experiences and voices of other women.

Finding those "voices" was the next challenge. I knew one of them needed to be Star: my long-time friend and "sister" who has a heart of gold and pipes like no one else I know. But who else? Kathryn and Peggy were two of the first names that came to me, but the three of us had spent many an audition competing against one another for the same lead in a show, or commercial, or voice-over. Could we "bury the hatchet" long enough to collaborate? Well, we've been at it over a year now, and our collaboration has evolved into a friendship and respect that has enriched us all. Our children have played together while we've rehearsed, and we have shared our joys and pains with one another. We've had some wonderful help along the way too–especially from Syd Riggs, who agreed to help us stage and conceive the show, and who has buoyed us up in many crucial moments.

We have learned the sobering lesson that things are not always as they appear that life hands each one of us trials; no one escapes this life without challenges that are tailor-made for us to learn from. We have also been reminded that sometimes our load can be lightened by having another person simply walk with us through our darkness.

We have subtitled this show Women on the Verge... because our show is about the things women labor through when they are just on the verge of crashing, soaring, giving in, giving up, questioning, discovering, breaking down, breaking through, and a hundred other emotions. Womanhood is filled with defining



moments that push us to our own distinct precipice. And where we go from there what we choose to do with our lives does make a difference to our children, our husbands, our friends, families, ourselves...the world. I Want it All is about four women, from different places, who want to sing about, and share with you, all of these things, so that we might better understand and appreciate... It's been a great journey for us... We hope you enjoy it, too.
