

The Boys of Brigadoon

To hear them tell the tale, the first meeting of one of the most illustrious creative teams in musical theatre was anything but glamorous. One hot night in 1942, both had come to lunch at New York's Lambs Club. One lost his way to the men's room, and as he wandered among the tables the two made eye contact. Loewe asked, "You're Lerner, aren't you? You write lyrics, don't you?" Lerner replied, "I try." "Well," Loewe asked, "would you like to write with me?"

Lerner agreed immediately. And that's how lyricist Alan Jay Lerner and composer Frederick "Fritz" Loewe became a team. Though they never did agree on which of them had been lost in the club that day, they made a true yolking of talent. They stuck together through five starvation years of successive flops before they created a show they believed was true magic—Brigadoon.

But the Broadway producers were a tough sell—every major producer on the Great White Way turned the show down . . . except the very last. Even then, money was hard to come by. "Fritz and I gave fifty-eight 'performances' for backers—meaning reading, singing and playing the entire play—before that exalted sum [of \$175,000] was finally corralled. Sometimes we would give three performances in one day, and we were one week into rehearsal when we went through our act for the last time" (Lees, p. 47).

On opening night, March 13, 1947, Lerner and Loewe's troubles melted in the glow of the critics' reviews like the Highland mist before the sun. New York Times critic Brook Atkinson himself called the play "a major achievement" that wove the theatrical arts of singing, dance, and story into a "pattern of enchantment." Burns Mantle included it in the Ten Best Plays of 1946–47. The 1947 Drama Critics' Circle Award for the year's best musical went "to Brigadoon, by Alan Jay Lerner and Frederick Loewe . . because its taste, discretion and thoughtful beauty mark a high note in any season, and because it finds the lyric theatre at its best" (Lees, p. 48).

Brigadoon enjoyed a long Broadway run, and has flourished for half a century as an audience favorite in stock theatre and on the silver screen. Lerner and Loewe went on to charm the world with Paint Your Wagon, Camelot, Gigi, and My Fair Lady. Everyone seemed impressed—except Lerner's crusty father. Lerner got this note from home: "Alan—I have counted the words you have used this week-end and you have an active vocabulary of 297 words. I don't see how you can make a career as a writer with an active vocabulary of 297 words. However, I believe you have talent and if you would like to return to school and study, I would be more than happy to subsidize you" (Green, p. 117).

Director's Note

by Marion I. Bentley

The power of love has been a favorite theme of artists. poets, and musicians throughout history. It has been treated in story, in song, in mythology, in ballet, and in opera. It has bridged racial differences as opposite as black and white in Shakespeare's Othello, contrasting physical types in Beauty and the Beast, and differences in religion, class, and culture in a variety of works.

The impteus for Lerner and Loewe's variation on the theme came from a German short story of the mid-19th century coupled with Alan Jay Lerner's admiration for the writings of James M. Barrie. Transferred from the German village of Germeishausen, *Brigadoon* bridges both time and cultures in a classic love story that plunges two contemporary New Yorkers into a remote Scottish village of 1797. The combination has given the show and the theme a freshness that has endured a multiplicity of revivals from Broadway to high schools and community theatres throughout the United States.

We hope that Brigadoon continues to provide the relevance to tonight's audience that it did to its opening night audience at Broadway's Zeigfeld Theatre on Thursday evening, March 13, 1947—just 50 years ago.
