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
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

# A Tribute to Max C. Golightly 1924-1997

Emeritus Professor Max Golightly, who retired from the BYU Department of Theatre & Film after twenty-eight years of teaching, passed away on April 10, 1997.

Perhaps one of the best ways to introduce the versatile personality of Max C. Golightly is to read his own description from his professional resume: "Retired professor in theatre and film, Brigham Young University, Provo, Utah; moderator of playwriting, actor, vocalist, M.C., show host; director of plays: contemporary, classical, and special-effects characterizations; lecturer in acting, playwriting, play directing, poetry, self encouragement."

For any who knew Max, all were amazed when meeting another acquaintance who knew Max through some entirely different aspect of his artistic expression! He was truly a marvel of energy, effervescence and effects.

With a bachelor of arts in radio broadcasting from BYU, Max began his teaching career in 1951 at Provo High School. Two years later found him at Citrus Junior College in Glendora, California, and four years later, he returned to the BYU Lab School. During his teaching assignments, he completed his Master of Arts degree at BYU with an emphasis in playwriting and directing. He joined the faculty in Theatre at BYU in 1961 where he taught for a span of 28 years.

Most of us know that Max's talents were not all funneled into theatre and education alone. Max had a voracious appetite for writing. His theatrical writings consist of some 30 plays, titles from which won local, regional and national recognition. His poetry also garnered its share of publication and awards.

But writing was only a part of what made Max Golightly who he was. He appeared on countless stages, and in a number of films. He directed numerous plays, including tragedies, comedies, farces, melodramas, musicals and premieres galore, for Max was "father" to the new play program at BYU. He also helped develop the Mask Club program and create the Playwrights/Directors/Actors Workshop.

But all these lists and titles are not the man we know as Max Golightly. He had the gift of giving (of himself, of his time, and of his talents) to anyone who needed them. . after which he became the greatest fan, the greatest support, and the greatest praiser of these same talents in others. When Max stood in a group he rarely stood to be seen as himself. He was the first to stand in ovation for another person.

Max Golightly isn't a man one experiences and puts in the past. He is like the best of books that one carries at his side and gleans from often. Max, because of you, we are rewarded again and again!

Neil Labute, (right) a graduate of BYU ('85), University of Kansas, and New York University, won the Filmmaker's Trophy for dramatic films at the 1997 Sundance Film Festival. His film, *In the Company of Men*, began as a play that received its initial reading at BYU, and received the 1993 Association for Mormon Letters Award for Drama. His award citation said, "Mr. Labute choses to write searing dramas which confront issues such as chauvinism and misogyny, victimization and cruelty, accusation and recrimination. It is through the careful, realistic, and theatrically effective portrayal of evil that Labute reveals its brutality, and shows it to be utterly repugnant. This is his gift, and it is a considerable one."

Neil was so shocked by his win at Sundance that he pulled out a disposable camera to record himself at the podium. "I don't believe this," he said, "So no one else will!"

However, the story doesn't end at Sundance. *In the Company of Men* was also selected to compete in the category "Of Certain Regard" at the 50th annual Cannes Film Festival.

In the Company of Men is slated for national release in August.

Marc Marriott, (left) who earned his BA in film at BYU in 1992, is in graduate school at UCLA's School of Film and Television. His first film at UCLA, *Short Order*, won the Prix Canal Plus at the Henri Langlois Film Festival in Poitiers, France, and received an award for excellence at the Independent Feature Film Market in New York. *Short Order*, a nine-minute short film that tells the simple story of a weary salesman who finds unexpected pleasure in cooking a short order omelet, has been broadcast on the Independent Film Channel, the Sundance Channel, and has been licensed for foreign broadcast by Canal Plus.

This year Marc was awarded the \$25,000 James Bridges Award in Film Directing, the largest annual grant given to a student filmmaker in the United States. The grant is presented each year to an MFA thesis directing student "who best embodies a commitment toward the integration of film with the techniques of theatre." The money will go toward producing his thesis film, *The Snow Child*, which filmed in Utah during March.



### **Department Notes**

Graduate students Nola Smith and Julie Manning and faculty members Eric Samuelsen and Tim Slover presented papers at the Text and Presentation Comparative Drama Conference XXI, which was held at the University of Florida in Gainesville, Florida. "We were all very well received," said Nola. "It was a triumph for BYU!"

The BYU Student Alumni Association annually honors the teachers that have made a difference in their academic careers. One of the instructors chosen to receive the Student Award for Excellence in Teaching this year was associate professor **David Morgan**. David was selected from nearly 1,000 professors nominated by graduating seniors.

Faculty members **Tom Lefler** and **Sterling VanWagenen** are executive producers of the new PBS series, *Ancestors*, the first national television series dedicated to genealogy and family history, which pre-




miered in January 1997. The series consists of ten half-hour episodes that explore the why and how-to of family history research through personal stories and expert instruction.

"The *Ancestors* project actually began almost 15 years ago," Tom Lefler explained. "It's been a long and difficult experience. You really have to believe in a project like this, or it will die."

That *Ancestors* was worth the time invested is now being demonstrated. It began as a television series, and has now expanded to include a Book of the Month offering (*Ancestors: A Beginner's Guide to Family History and Genealogy*) that is in its second printing, and an Internet page (www.pbs.org/kbyu/ancestors) that has attracted more than six million visitors since January.

"Ancestors is an example of one of the best ways that LDS artists and communicators can invest their time," Tom added. "It's not a blockbuster," he concluded, "but in a quiet way, it's doing its work."



Film student Matt Davis was awarded a regional College Emmy this spring for his animated short film, *Mortimer Monkey*. The College Emmys are awarded by the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, and Matt received his \$400 award at a banquet held in Los Angeles. *Mortimer Monkey* is a hand-drawn animation that was done in a style reminiscent of the old silent cartoons.

Matt graduated this April with a double major in film and history. Coincidentally, he also received word the same week that a History 490 paper that he wrote about Walt Disney, "The City of Tomorrow," won the History Department's annual Community History Award.

### The National Irene Ryan Acting Awards: Continuing a BYU Tradition

**Stephanie Foster Breinholt**, a BYU MFA candidate in theatre design and technology, won the top acting award in the country at the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival held in Washington D.C. in April. She received one of two national Irene Ryan Acting Awards and a \$2,500 scholarship.

Stephanie, who competed in the Winner's Circle Evening of Scenes as one of the 16 regional winners from throughout the nation, performed a scene from BYU professor Tim Slover's new play about Handel, *Joyful Noise*, and a monologue from Lanford Wilson's *Serenading Louie*. "They told us that over 18,000 students competed nationally for this award," said Breinholt. "I really didn't expect to win, especially since a BYU student won last year as well."

This is the fourth time in six years that a BYU student has won this national acting award: Scott Claflin won in 1991, Kevin Rahm in 1994, and Mireille Enos in 1996.

Last year (1996), two Brigham Young University students competed as finalists at the Kennedy Center: **Mireille Enos** and **Jason Tatom**. Not only did Mireille receive the Irene Ryan award, but she was also the first-ever winner of the National Classical Acting Award, which was initiated that year.

**Kevin Rahm** won the Irene Ryan award in 1994, along with a scholarship to the National Stage Combat Workshop. While in Washington, Kevin also performed the lead in the BYU production of *Prisoner*, an original play by BYU alum James A. Bell which won the National Student Playwriting Award for that same year.
