Program Notes

There has been more written in the English language by and about William Shakespeare, his work, and his life, than on any other subject but the Bible. But who was Shakespeare? Generations have been obsessed with this mystery. Erudite or illiterate? Man or myth?

The hard facts are readily available for anyone with the time and inclination to find them out. But to present the man who dug so deeply into the human soul, I must dig too. Perhaps you will excuse me if I have applied his own theatrical dictum in conceiving the piece and ask you to join me and "make imaginary puissance." Let us explore his life and times, the thoughts and events that informed both poet and master storyteller, the man behind the most enduring canon of work in the language. To paraphrase himself: "Age cannot wither [him] nor custom stale [his] infinite variety."

Biographical Notes

Actor-writer-director GREGORY BELL has gained repute at home and abroad. His rich and varied theatrical experience in over 60 plays includes major roles in, or direction of, more than a dozen of Shakespeare's works. This is his first play as author. His most recent appearance was with the Riverside Conservatory Series in California as Cyrano de Bergerac, where some members of the opening night audience may best remember him for the loss of his nose! He has appeared as the Bard in all media except film (. . anyone?) and in hologram form on the Bard Card, a cheque guarantee card in the U.K. Mr. Bell has also performed numerous benefits for, among others, the Shakespeare Globe Centre of London.

SHERMAN HOWARD is principally known for his work as an actor. Several years ago he made the transition from 15 years of regional theatre, where he played such roles as Hamlet, Macbeth, and Malvolio, to the world of Los Angeles. episodic television, in which he has most recently appeared on L.A. Law, Seinfeld, Quantum Leap, Star Trek, The Young Riders, and Major Dad. In addition, he appears in the recurring role of Lex Luthor on the syndicated series Superboy, for which he has written several episodes. He made his directorial debut in New York with the Lakota Theatre production of the one-act play "Tracks," which he also wrote. His work in the present production marks another transition, the topography of which is yet unfolding.

CHARM LAURITZEN grew up in theatre and has been involved with the arts on many different levels throughout her life. She has helped to produce documentaries on subjects ranging from buildings to births to drunk driving to dancing. She has enjoyed producing, directing, and otherwise working on plays, films, and commercials in Utah and is now plunging into producing in California. What is more important, she believes in the fundamentals of life: sunshine, a cool fresh breeze, rain to dance in, and deep, rich mud to squish between her toes.
